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Stevens Alumni Day 2024 Our 153rd Celebration!

With a precision we have all become accustomed to, the annual Stevens High Alumni Parade kicked off at 10:30 AM sharp on June 8, 2024. The theme was Rock 'n' Roll, and the many classes who participated made great use of the theme with a wide variety of floats and props. Although the skies looked a bit threatening at times, we fortunately experienced no rain in the course of the parade! The parade chain took a shorter route than the previous year. After leaving Broad Street and taking a right onto South Street, the parade continued down Pleasant Street. It then marched down to Glidden Street where it took a right followed by another right back on to Broad Street to disassemble in front of the high school.

Once again, the energetic Dick Girard served as the parade chairman and successfully pulled together 50 units varying from small fife and drum groups to



Shriners groups to the ever-popular Leapin' Lena. With his reliable team of volunteers, they planted all the parade line-up signs and no parking signs on Broad Street the night before the parade and got every unit lined up and in their places on the morning of the parade. Many thanks, once again, to the Claremont Police Department for their help with safety and traffic flow and to the Claremont Fire Department for putting up the Stevens High and St. Mary's High alumni banners on Pleasant Street.

With the Claremont Police Department and Sullivan County Sherriff vehicles leading the parade chain, next came the first musical group. In the past, that first musical group has been the combined bands of Stevens High and the Middle School. But we added a twist in 2024 when Dick reached out the Stevens High music director Taylor Trudeau and asked her what she thought of including alumni in the band. She loved the idea. We put out a notice on Facebook over the winter and in the 2024 newsletter which attracted more than a dozen alumni who wanted to take part. In the end, 11 alumni joined on the day of the parade, making Dick's idea a very successful one. The impression made by the larger band, with all the members in new matching shirts purchased for the occasion, was enthusiastically applauded and admired all along the route.

Two horse-pulled carriages followed the band with the first carriage, conveying SHS Alumni Association officers, being pulled by two Belgian Draft horses named Sam and Charlie. The two equines are old hands at this with the 2024 parade being their third year in a row. They spend the rest of their year on the Streeter-Woods farm in Orford. Aside from their farming duties, they also do lots of winter events in the Upper Valley including sleigh rides and Christmas events. The second carriage, in which the homecoming king and queen and junior prom king and queen rode, was also pulled by two Belgian Draft horses, Jake and Rudy. They live on the Warren farm in Alstead and spend most of their time working together plowing and haying and helping out wherever needed. Owner Janice Warren told us that Jake and Rudy love the opportunity to be in the parade each year and are always energized by the sights, sounds and people in the parade and along the parade route.

Next, came the Parade Marshall, former Social Studies teacher Fred Hill, selected by the class of 1999. Fred began working at Stevens High in 1990, and although he left the

school for a period of time in 1997 to take care of ailing parents, he made a big impression on the class of 1999 as he had most of them in his class in their freshman and sophomore years. So even though he was not at Stevens during their junior and senior years,



the class of 1999 never forgot what a great teacher and mentor Mr. Hill was and were thrilled to be able to have him serve as the 2024 Parade Marshall. In fact, Hill is now back at Stevens since 2010 teaching in the Special Education department. SHS Principal Michael Herrington and SAU 6 Superintendent Chris Pratt followed in their cars. This was Herrington's first parade as principal as he had been officially hired into the role not long before alumni weekend. It was Pratt's second time participating in the parade.

The SHS Alumni Association is, of course, made up of alumni from the high school. But in addition to those members, we invite teachers and school staff who have worked at the school for at least 15 years to become Honorary Members. At the 2024 parade, we welcomed retired chemistry teacher Vesselina Alteva into the fold by having her ride in the parade announcing her as an Honorary Member. She also spoke at the Association luncheon following the parade and gave her heartfelt thanks for the honor and spoke fondly of her years teaching Stevens students.

The Yankee Doodle Band, with their freshly-ironed uniforms, followed along with several class floats including classes from the 1940's. In fact, the Class of 1949 float had five members on it, all in their early 90's, and they won a trophy for their efforts. (See a full list of the trophy winners below.) Two classes from the 1960's ('64 and '69) followed with appropriately-themed rock 'n' roll floats from their era. St. Mary's also had a nice showing in the parade with floats from the classes of 1954 and 1969.

The small but mighty New Hampshire Pipes and Drums Corps followed in their beautiful kilts with Leapin' Lena hot on their heels. Always a delight to see Lena, she once again, did not disappoint. The Mt. Sinai Motor Corp followed with their zippy go-carts and were a big hit with the audience, young and old alike.

The class of 1974 had an enormous float and a DJ on board loudly playing hits from their time in school. Some great songs from Aerosmith, Boston, Led Zeppelin, AC/DC and others could be heard for miles around when they passed by! The class of 1979 created a float in tribute to the Beatles and were awarded a trophy for their considerable effort. The class of 1984 honored MTV with their float as the television station had launched while they were at Stevens. It truly was a momentous launch and was a cultural phenomenon in their high school years and thus a great theme for the float. They also paid tribute to some musical stars from the era with one classmate dressed as Boy George, another as Cyndi Lauper and one as Tina Turner.

The Colchester, Connecticut Fife & Drum Corp followed along with the class of 1989 and their float whose theme was 80's Hair Bands. They had a live band on their float playing hits from back in the days and plenty of classmates sporting Big Hair for the day. More Shriners then came along in their mini trucks and vehicles and did lots of circles and fun moves in the streets of Claremont. The class of 1994 paid tribute to Nirvana and even had a replica of the now world-famous baby who adorned the cover of the band's album Nevermind. The class of 1999 soon came along and apparently had embraced the grunge movement of their era as that was the theme of their float.

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The Marlborough, Connecticut Fife & Drum Corps followed with people taking note of the bass drummer because the drum was bigger than him! He clearly took his duties seriously and kept the band on time and in cadence with his beats. He made quite an impression as he marched by the parade watchers. The class of 2004 came along next with their 90's rock era float paying tribute to the years before they even entered Stevens. The music of the 90's clearly had resonated with all of them.

Hill's Band Wagon members, next in the parade chain, pile into their colorful wagon each year and always put on a good show for us. Some very talented musicians in that group, for sure! The class of 2009 came next and showcased the start of the social media era by presenting a Myspace float. Myspace launched in 2003 and became a hugely successful social media platform used by millions of people throughout the 2000's. Car Nutz came along next and had a few interesting vehicles in the parade including a Munsters-like roadster whose top pivoted up and down as the car rolled along the parade route. The class of 2014 was next with a simple rock 'n' roll themed float. Firehouse Six showed up next. They are a small Dixieland band who delighted the audience with their upbeat music all along the parade route.

The class of 2019 was next in a School of Rock themed float. They had a great turnout and had an enormous amount of school spirit, whooping and hollering all along the route from Broad Street on! They too won a trophy for their float. The class of 2024, full of energy and pep like their 2019 brethren, came along next with a very big float. We wish them all the success in the world as they embark on their future endeavors.

Finally, the local ATV club and the Claremont Fire Department closed out the parade chain.

Steve Smith, of the Newport-based radio station WCNL, called the parade from the reviewing stand on Pleasant Street, introducing floats and units as they made their way up the Pleasant Street hill. Claremont's own Community TV (CCTV) filmed the parade, and if you go to claremontv.org, you can click on the Channel 8 tab and search for "parade" where you can watch the parade in its entirety.

As mentioned above, prizes are given to the most creative floats. It's never easy to narrow down the pool of floats, but that's the job of the judges, and they get it done every year. The following classes were awarded trophies as well as \$200 for their class fund:

In addition, the Claremont Chamber of Commerce names a float award each year, and for the 2024 parade, they chose St. Mary's class of 1969 as their trophy winner for its "American Bandstand" themed float.

The Annual Meeting took place in the high school cafeteria when the parade finished, and over 50 alumni joined the meeting and luncheon. One Way Bakery (formerly known as Uptown Bakery) catered the event with delicious sandwiches, salads and desserts. At the luncheon



and meeting, former classmates reconnected with each other and shared stories from back in the day and about their current lives. Once the meeting began, we heard remarks from the Stevens Principal, Michael Herrington and then SHSAA President Dick Girard ran the meeting where the congregation approved the minutes and treasurer's report; voted on the slate of SHSAA Executive Board Members; paid tribute to new Honorary Member Vesselina Alteva; selected the winners of the Parade Fundraiser; and voted on the theme for the 2025 parade.

As mentioned above, one of the items voted on at the Annual Meeting was the theme for the 2025 parade. Suggested themes had been submitted from Association officers, Executive Board members and others. The Association officers, at their May 2024 meeting, narrowed down a long list of parade themes to six for the vote at the meeting. I am pleased to report the June 14, 2025 parade theme is: A Year to Remember

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President's Letter - 2025

Greetings to my fellow alumni!

We look forward to welcoming you all to another alumni reunion weekend! We had a very successful and busy year, and in this letter I will share some of the highlights

After moving into our new office in August 2023, we have continued to make improvements. For instance, we purchased a second computer for use in the office so that when our Secretary (Jan Eno) and Assistant Secretary (Bev Janelle) are there at the same time, they can both be as productive as possible. We are fortunate to have a small but active group of volunteers, officers and Executive Board members help us undertake all the activities we pursue in a given year, but we are always ready to welcome new members to join the fold. We hold monthly meetings, at our office, which are open to all alumni. The meetings take place every month from September to May (except December) on the third Wednesday of the month at 5:30 PM. Notices of the meeting are always advertised on our Facebook page. We would love to see more alumni attend the meetings and get involved in the Association.

In June of 2026 I plan to step down as Parade Chairman, a role I have enjoyed for over 40 years in one way or another and leading the effort for the past 10 years. By 2026 I will be into my 80's and ready to hand the responsibility over. Ideally, we would like to find someone who is interested in this role sooner rather than later so they can work with me on the 2025 and 2026 parades to learn the ropes. In addition to the above, some of the Association officers have been in their roles a long time, like I have, and they will be retiring in the coming years. As such, we will be looking for alumni to join us in these roles. The roles are not that time-consuming and they are a great way to meet people and contribute to a very worthy cause. Remember, we are the oldest active high school alumni association in the United States. This is an organization that has been operating continuously since 1871 and it behooves all of us to keep this unique, community-minded and philanthropic organization running for many more decades. Don't forget that we give out up to \$100,000 a year in scholarships to Stevens High graduates. It is crucial that we are able to continue to do that in the future as the cost of attending college or community college certainly isn't going to decline anytime soon.

If you attended the 2024 parade you will have seen a much larger SHS/CMS band. That's because we worked with the high school music director to invite alumni to join the band. It was an idea that came to me after the 2023 parade, and the high school enthusiastically embraced it. We had eleven alumni take part. They received the sheet music a few weeks in advance of the parade and had the opportunity to practice with the band. They were thrilled to be able to don the red & black once again and march down the streets of Claremont as they had when they were Stevens students. You will have also noticed that we purchased new shirts for all the band members resulting in a great-looking contingent as they made their way through town.

For the first time ever, we hosted a Cornhole fundraising event at Running Bear campground in Ascutney, Vermont in May. It was a great deal of fun and so well attended that we will be doing it again in May of this year. More details can be found elsewhere in this letter. In addition, we had another successful poinsettia fundraiser in December and will continue that annual tradition going forward.

We are reliant on alumni dues and contributions to do all the good work we do. They annual dues are still only \$10 a year which comes out to less than 3 cents per day. You will see at the back of this newsletter how you can pay your dues, make contributions and purchase parade fundraiser tickets. We also have a website, highlighted elsewhere in this newsletter, where you can pay your alumni dues there. Please note that if your class also asks for annual dues to build your class fund, you should pay any class dues to your class representative directly. 



To commemorate our 45th alumni reunion, we chose "Beatlemania" as our float theme for the 2024 parade. The Beatles originally formed in the early 1960's when members of the class of 1979 were born and they have remained a legendary force in rock and roll to this day. We believed this choice would allow us to create something that would be recognized and appreciated by all generations and age groups, and we were so right! Our vision was to create a likeness of the iconic "Yellow Submarine". We began by framing three sides of classmate Arnold Craigue's twenty-four-foot trailer with chicken wire which we stuffed with yellow and blue tissue paper. We obtained replicas of the porthole windows with the Beatles' faces and several of their most famous album covers, as well as over 100 titles of Beatles' hits in oversized, multi-colored letters, all of which we attached to both sides of the float. We also designed two different Beatles-themed banners for the front and back of the float. All of these beautiful graphics were created for us by Dolittle's Print Serve, who did an excellent job. We added more chicken wire to the rear ramps and stuffed it with psychedelic tissue paper. Mounted on the trailer hitch was a very realistic "Octopus's Garden" that was meticulously created by classmate Bimbo Dansereau, and we zip tied several stuffed sea creatures to the front and back of the float to complete the image of an under-the-sea utopia. Classmate Tyke Matheson generously donated fluorescent yellow t-shirts with a silhouette of the famous "Abbey Road" album cover across the front for us all to wear. (As an aside, we think it's really great that Bimbo and Tyke still go by those monikers.) We had a play list of Beatles' hits blasting from 2 speakers at the front of the float, and it was so moving to hear the crowd, especially the young children, singing along with us as we passed by along the parade

It was definitely a labor of love, and we were incredibly proud when our float was presented with the George Disnard Memorial Trophy. graduating in 1946, has missed only one SHS Alumni Day and that was in 2024. She can be readily excused for that, though, as she turned 97 years old that same month and doesn't get out as much as she used to. She has been one of the most loyal graduates of Stevens since her time at the school and still serves as the Secretary for her class, 78 years after she and her classmates donned their caps and gowns. And at the banquets held in previous years, she was always the oldest attending member. She never missed one.

Barbara and her twin sister Lorraine were raised in town. Their father, always in his straw hat, worked at a grocery store on Pleasant Street and was known far and wide in the community. Their mother was a homemaker. Barbara and her sister were very active members of the student body while at Stevens. Barbara loved her years at the school and took part in Chorus, the Drama Club, Intramural Basketball, the Red and Black Yearbook and Junior Prom Committee among other activities. In her senior year, she even served as a Claremont Tax Assessor.

Barbara credits her energy and can-do attitude to her upbringing and specifically, the advice her mother gave her which was "To make your own decisions. Be in charge of your life." And that's what she has done. She also understands that fate sometimes intervenes in life and takes one in an unexpected direction. "Whatever will be, will be" she knows to be true. But the key to success, she says, depends on how you react to what has happened to you. She likes sharing her views on living a fulfilling life and as Secretary for her class, she always closes out her communications to her classmates with the following:

Try to do something every day, Don't sit in a chair and wither away, Hope to see you in June, Take care and enjoy yourself always.

After graduation, Barbara began working for the John Hancock Life Insurance company where she remained for 35 years. She was an administrative assistant there and says that one of her roles was to keep all the men in line at the office! As in high school, Barbara kept very active her whole life, for instance, walking two to four miles every weekday to keep in shape and stay strong.

Barbara is thankful for the very good life she has had in Claremont and has been especially appreciative of her loving family and her many good friends in the immediate area and beyond. At this point in her life, getting around isn't as easy as it used to be, so one of the things she likes to do to stay sharp is to watch games shows on television. She also has frequent visitors to her home to keep her company.

John Ring Class of 1964

John was born in Claremont though his parents
were brought up elsewhere — his mother in
Brandon, VT and his dad

in Hanover. John says the family comes from a long line of hardy New Englanders who arrived in the new world from England and Wales in 1638, making John an 11th generation American.

John grew up in town, first on Broad Street and then on Myrtle and had the good fortune of attending the Way and Bluff schools before the Junior High and Stevens. Given where he lived, John walked to school every day from kindergarten to 12th. While at Stevens, John liked and excelled in Math but wasn't so keen on the sciences, Chemistry in particular. He credits his teachers for providing him a first-rate education and named Paul Jobin and Wade Perkins as two of his favorites. While at Stevens, John not only focused on his studies,

as he knew he wanted to go to college, but also was on Student Council, was an organizer of the Junior Prom and served as the yearbook editor in his senior year. After graduation, John headed to Babson College in Massachusetts to pursue a degree in Business Administration and Accounting.

John finished his degree in three years, and in 1967 began working for one of the "Big Eight" accounting firms. At the time, that was the standard career path for anyone who aspired to become a CPA. You would work for a Big Eight for two to four years and then get your CPA license. He did exactly that and moved back to the Upper Valley to take a position with a Hanover CPA firm in 1969. John worked with them until 1971, when he started his own firm in Claremont.

From the onset of his own business, John worked mostly with family-owned businesses and, believe it or not, still works with some of those early clients today! For many years, he ran his business out of his home on the Charlestown Road and then moved to the Eastman community in Enfield and opened an office in West Lebanon. He eventually moved to Vermont and worked from home for many years until he sold his Norwich home in 2022 and bought a place in New York City. He now splits his time between New York and Miami Beach and continues to work with his clients.

In reflecting on his youth, John said it was a true blessing to grow up in a company town like Claremont. The Joy factory offered steady employment for hundreds of families thus creating a stability in town. Families did well in Claremont and stayed put. That meant that virtually all the students who John started with in kindergarten graduated with him in 1964. Not many towns or cities can offer that kind of experience, and John is forever grateful for it. As a result, over the years, and continuing to the present time, John directs most of his annual charitable donations to local organizations like Stevens itself, the SHS Alumni Association, the CSB Community Center and others.



Doug Agan Class of 1975

David and his family explored the U.S. living in
several states in David's
first five years due to the

demands of his father's job. On a project his dad was on in Bogota, Colombia in 1962, they happened to be using Joy Manufacturing equipment. His father soon made a trip to Claremont to learn more about Joy, took a job there and moved the family to town in 1963. His parents enrolled David in Way School for first grade, and then at St. Mary's after that. David's four siblings, Jim, Michelle, Jeff and Debbie also attended Claremont schools.

In high school, David played soccer all four years and basketball with the local Christian Youth Organization, which included many of his friends from St. Mary's. He cites Mr. Grenier and Mr. Kaplinski as being his most influential teachers at Stevens. He said it was clear they loved their jobs and cared deeply about the learning their students achieved in the classroom. Because Claremont had a large population of post-war, baby boom students in the 1970's, David said this created a fun, spirit-filled environment at Stevens with many students involved in sports, music and other extracurricular activities.

After graduating, David took a few sports jobs, coaching girls Junior High soccer, J.V. soccer at Stevens for two years and coaching and reffing in Claremont's PeeWee soccer league. David moved to Enfield in 1984, worked for a time at Dartmouth Hitchcock and then took a job at Hypertherm where he remained until retiring in 2019. He began as an Assembler and then moved into Research & Development. The company was, and still is, employee-owned and David said this made for a family-like environment where everyone worked hard and chipped in whenever and wherever needed. In fact, such a strong bond was created among David and his former colleagues, they still meet up on a monthly basis for dinners. During his Hypertherm years, David kept one foot in the sporting world coaching many school teams and serving as a referee at countless youth soccer and basketball games.

In the 1990's Hypertherm launched a philanthropic division in order to begin contributing to the local communities. The company encouraged employees to volunteer and gave them paid days off every year to do that. David began offering his time at his namesake if you will—David's House, at Dartmouth Hitchcock. David's House is a resource for people who have family members battling serious illnesses at the hospital. For instance, it provides housing, and other services, for parents if their child is in the hospital for weeks or months at a time.





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David eventually joined the Board of Directors for David's House and served in that role for six years. He found this to be a very meaningful experience and is thankful to Hypertherm for instilling that sense of community and volunteerism in him and so many others.

In his retirement, David lives with his wife Kari in Enfield and keeps busy with a variety of projects, volunteer work and spending time with their children and grandchildren.



Kelly **Fontaine** Class of 1985

School District for a combined 95 years? Kelly Fontaine can. Her mother Lucy, a 1961 St. Mary's graduate, worked in the cafeteria at West Terrace and Maple Avenue from 1978 to 2004. Kelly's dad Dennis, a 1963 Stevens graduate, worked as a high school custodian from 1970 to 2006. And Kelly has been a Stevens Special Education teacher since 1990. In fact her dad's office was located, before recent renovations, directly across the hall from where she teaches today! Kelly is also the proud parent of two Stevens alumni, daughter Briaunna (Class of 2012) and son Josh (Class

Kelly reports that she wasn't necessarily thrilled with her time at Stevens. It wasn't that she did not like her classes or her teachers, but rather that she was very shy. High school, as we all know, is a never-ending series of highly social situations which can prove intimidating for some. One of the reasons Kelly enjoys teaching Special Education is that she can create an environment where the students feel they belong and where they can be successful.

Working with students who have significant cognitive challenges is something Kelly loves. And because, by New Hampshire state law, Special Education students can continue their studies until age 22, Kelly has on occasion worked with certain students for eight or nine consecutive years, allowing her to develop strong bonds with them. Kelly earned her Bachelor's degree from Lyndon State in Elementary and Special Education in 1990. After graduation, she moved back home to begin her

job search and, lo and behold, a role opened up that summer at Stevens. She applied, was accepted and began teaching at the high school in September 1990.

The Life Skills program is at the core of what Kelly does. She teaches her students money skills, how to prepare simple meals, how to maintain good health, how to do laundry, how to handle situations like eating out at restaurants and interacting with others in the community. The essential idea is to provide the students with skills they need to become as independent as possible, even if they continue to live with their parents into adulthood. In fact, some of her former students have gone on to employment in the area, and one even works in the high school cafeteria.

This fall Kelly will begin her 35th year teaching at Stevens and will carry on the Fontaine family tradition of hard work and dedication to the Claremont School District!



Courtney **Sharkey** Porter Class of 1993

Courtney took this learning to heart, and in her professional career has focused on educational inclusion in the communities where she has lived. Courtney also had the great fortune of having a supportive cheerleading coach, Jen Ferland, throughout her four years at Stevens and is now a colleague of Jen's at Stevens, where they both work.

Upon completing her undergraduate degree at Keene State and earning a Master's in Social Work at UNH, Courtney taught for 13 years in the Alstead school system. She then moved to Vermont's Northeast Kingdom where she was the director of the region's Headstart program. In 2013, she moved back to Claremont and was hired into a new role at SAU6 to be the school system's Social Worker. She has remained in that job ever since and currently has an office at the high school from where she covers all the district's schools. Courtney's goal is to make sure all students have the support needed to be successful in school and works closely with families and organizations in town to meet the needs of all SAU students. For instance, she coordinates the annual Back to School festival offering backpacks and supplies to Claremont students and includes partners in the community such as the Elks, Kiwanis, Turning Points, TLC, River Church and others. And she is especially thankful to National Field Representatives as they have been the lead sponsor of the event for several years.

For all the great work she has done in the community, Courtney was selected as the Claremont Citizen of the Year in 2019. She truly appreciated the honor and the fact that leaders in the city recognize the importance of the work she is doing with students and fam-

Finally, Courtney is also the proud mom of two children, one of whom finished her high school years in Vermont and the other, Cade who is a 2018 graduate of Stevens.



Shaylor Duranleau Class of 2005

By Mark Chamberlain Shaylor is a proud member of a true Stevens High legacy family. Not only did both his parents

attend Stevens (Leo Duranleau and Lori Mullen - Class of 1978), his grandfather, also named Leo Duranleau, graduated in 1950.

Shaylor attributes much of his career success to the Sugar River Valley Regional Tech Center. Established in 1992 in the building next to the Middle School, the center offers technical programs in Building, Machine Tool, Culinary, Engineering and Plumbing & Heating, all designed to prepare students for careers in the trades. When Shaylor was a student, he took the Plumbing & Heating classes as well Computer Networking & Hardware courses that were offered then. He credits Doug Morton, who taught at the center for over two decades, for setting him on the right path by being a great teacher, advisor and confidante.

Shaylor gained work experience, after graduating, at Dartmouth Health in computer networking and with ARC Mechanical in Bradford, VT where he apprenticed and became a master plumber. In that job, he also benefitted from having earned his oil burner tech license while in high school. And during those first few years out of school, Shaylor gave back to the Tech Center by being part of the Trade Committee which would bring in practitioners like him to talk to the students about their careers.

After ARC, Shaylor moved into what's known as "control work." This involves setting up the computer networks and programs which run the plumbing, AC/Heat and water systems of large organizations like hospitals. for instance. After a year in his new role, he was given the opportunity to work in the California office and moved to Anaheim. Out there, he eventually moved to a different company, Sunbelt Controls, and worked on control implementation projects with such organizations as Disney Studios, NASA's Jet Propulsion Lab, and Warner Brothers, among others.

Eight years into his California stint, Shaylor realized he wanted to move back to New Hampshire. He was able to buy the Unity house his grandparents had owned, wanting to keep it in the family, and now happily lives there. For four years though, he was still working in California while owning and maintaining the Unity home. During that time, one of his Sunbelt colleagues was also moving back east, to South Carolina, and was starting up his own company doing similar control implementation work they had done together. Shaylor joined forces with his colleague, and they now run a company called The Graddy Group. They have five employees, and they program and consult for controls contractors across the


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


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






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Principal's Letter By Michael Herrington EdD

As we approach the halfway mark of the 2024-2025 school year, I'm filled with a sense of pride as I reflect on my first full year as principal of Stevens High School. This year, like any other, has presented us with both triumphs and challenges, moments of celebration and opportunities for growth. One of the most significant changes this year was the transition from a block schedule to a traditional period schedule. Moving from four 78-minute classes to seven 46-minute classes was a major shift for everyone. Naturally, such a change brought its share of adjustments. However, I've been consistently impressed by the adaptability and positive attitude of our students and teachers. My classroom walkthroughs have revealed a noticeable increase in student engagement, with shorter class periods fostering a more focused and dynamic learning environment. Looking ahead, we're committed to providing teachers with more dedicated planning time, ensuring they have the resources and support needed to maximize student success in this new structure.

Academically, Stevens High continues to prioritize expanding opportunities for our students. We've strengthened our partnership with River Valley Community College, further increasing the number of Dual Enrollment courses available. This year, we're particularly excited to announce the addition of American Sign Language to our Dual Enrollment offerings, providing students with valuable skills and college credit. We're constantly exploring new avenues to enhance our curriculum and equip our students with the tools they need to thrive in an ever-evolving world.

Beyond the classroom, we've made a concerted effort to cultivate a stronger sense of school spirit. This year saw the revival of pep rallies, a tradition that has been met with tremendous enthusiasm. Spearheaded by our dedicated English teacher, Megan Coughlin, these events have become a vibrant celebration of Stevens High pride, bringing together students and staff in a shared atmosphere of excitement and camaraderie. We plan to continue these pep rallies as a staple of our school culture.

Our athletic programs have also enjoyed a remarkable year. In the fall, every single team that competed in playoff contention made it to the playoffs. Our varsity girls soccer team achieved an outstanding season, earning the title of NHIAA Division 3 state runner-up. Our varsity football team reclaimed the Silva Cup with a decisive victory over Fall Mountain, while our varsity boys soccer team proudly brought home the Bernard Cup, also defeating Fall Mountain. Our varsity field hockey team retained the Deschaine/Flint cup with a win over Newport. Our varsity girls basketball team made a strong run to the NHIAA Division 3's final four. Furthermore, Stevie Rheaume won the NHIAA division 1 bowling individual championship, a testament to his dedication and skill. These achievements are a source of immense pride for our school and community.

Of course, this year has also presented us with significant challenges. As many of you are aware, we experienced a distressing incident involving four students who brought an incredibly realistic BB gun into the school. This led to a lockdown and a comprehensive room-by-room search by law enforcement. I cannot overstate the gravity of this situation and the profound impact it has had on our students, staff, and the wider community. It was a terrifying moment for everyone involved.

In the aftermath of this incident, I've been deeply moved by the outpouring of support and solidarity within our school community. Our students and staff have demonstrated remarkable resilience, reaching out to one another with compassion and understanding. We have worked closely with law enforcement and mental health professionals to provide support and resources to those affected. We have reviewed and updated our safety protocols, and are committed to creating a safe and secure learning environment for all our students. While the emotional wounds of this event will take time to heal, I am confident that we will emerge stronger and more united. I am grateful for the rapid and effective response of our local law enforcement, and for the students and staff who were able to follow all safety protocols during the lockdown. This is a situation that could have easily gone much worse and I am grateful for the response of all involved.

Looking ahead, we remain focused on our mission of providing a high-quality education and fostering a supportive and inclusive community. We are committed to continuous improvement, and we value the input and support of our alumni. Your connection to Stevens High is a vital part of our school's legacy, and we are grateful for your continued involvement. We hope that you will stay connected with us and continue to support our efforts to provide the best possible education for our students.

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The Art Teacher By Mark Chamberlain



Generations of Stevens High students had the pleasure of taking class with beloved Art teacher John Bennett starting in 1968 until his retirement in June 2013. That stretch of 47 years at Stevens makes him one of the longest-tenured teachers in the history of the school.

Bennett grew up in Newport and graduated from Towle High School in Newport in 1962 and went on to do his undergraduate work at Keene State College and the University of New Hampshire. He graduated from Keene in 1967 with a degree in Art Education. He also attended summer programs at Southern Connecticut University, while an undergrad, from which he earned a Certificate in Arts Education for grades K-16. This meant he was qualified to teach students from the kindergarten level all the way to seniors in college.

Bennett took his first job at Fall Mountain High School in the 1967-68 academic year. He was then recruited to join the Stevens faculty and began in September 1968. In his early years with the Claremont School District, art teachers were as rare as hen's teeth. As a result, Bennett shuttled between teaching roles at the high school, the junior high school and the elementary schools. He was one busy man, yet with his powers of persuasion, he was soon able to convince the school board to hire more art teachers into the district.

Bennett told me that one of the keys to his success was establishing trust between himself and the students. When he started working at the high school in 1968, young people were becoming less trusting of figures of authority in U.S. society. He knew that the students had to learn to trust him as their teacher, and he had to learn to trust them as his students. He did this by empowering them to take on projects that would challenge them and help them grow. He worked to help them develop their skills of independent thinking and being open-minded to new ideas, art forms and different mediums. And he wasn't afraid to have the difficult conversations offering constructive criticism and grading projects appropriately. Students quickly learned that if they did not put in the work, Bennett would not just give them a pass.

Bennett was not only working in the classroom instructing students over the decades. In addition, if you happened to see any stage production in Claremont in the 1970's into the 2000's at Stevens or at The Claremont Opera House, chances are that Mr. Bennett had a hand in it. In fact, he was also involved in the extensive restoration of the Opera House itself in the 1970's when it was brought back to its original glory after falling into disrepair over the decades. At the high school, John also served as an advisor to the Drama Club, the senior play and any musical productions that took place. And, as you would expect, he was in charge of designing the sets for these productions.

For a time, Bennett was also a member of Claremont's City Council, a member of the town's Conservation Commission and a Director on the Board of the Claremont Opera House. In fact, the Opera House recently named their lobby in honor of Mr. Bennett. It's clear that Bennett's ideas and influence were felt far beyond the walls of Stevens High in the many years he served the community. His influence was at times felt even wider than the confines of Claremont. After taking a summer course at Harvard on the Middle East, Bennett was able to join a team of academics on a trip to Egypt where they met with senior officials from the U.S. Embassy and the World Bank. Bennett described it as a truly eye-opening experience to see all the beautiful art and architecture in that part of the world and to learn about the region's culture and politics. A once in a lifetime opportunity for sure!

Looking back on his years in the Claremont School District, Bennett said he was especially proud of the quality education he and his fellow teachers offered Stevens students. For instance, Bennett was part of the cohort of teachers who taught the Humanities class to juniors. It was an interdisciplinary course focused on western civilization from Ancient Greece through to the Age of Enlightenment. Several years after it launched, an American Studies class was developed to pick up where Humanities left off and to bring students to the present. Mr. Bennett, along with Misters Jobin and Magoon attended a conference each summer that followed the same format as the Stevens courses and thus were able to tweak the classes a bit each year in order to achieve an even higher level of excellence. In fact, the courses were so successful that other schools across the state followed Stevens lead and created similar courses for their students.

Bennett said he especially enjoyed the diversity of backgrounds of the students in the 1970's and 80's. The town, because of its many job opportunities offered by companies like Joy Manufacturing, Tambrands, Sullivan and others, attracted job seekers from all over the country and the world. This resulted in a wonderful mix of families that all came together to create a great sense of community in town. Parents were supportive of the school and its efforts to educate their youth, and that combination of involved parents and dedicated teachers led Stevens to be one of the top performing high schools in the state in the 1970's and 80's.

Bennett shared that his most fortunate and important happenstance in his life was to have met a young woman when he was at Keene State. Her name was Carol Mooney, and not long after they graduated college, he and Carol married. She had also pursued a degree in Education and worked for a number of years at the Bluff School, Charlestown Primary, Fall Mountain High and for many years as the Principal in the Alstead/Acworth/Landon school district. As of the time of our interview in summer 2024, John and Carol had been married 56 years! In their retirement, John and Carol now split their time between homes in Camden, Maine; Port Charlotte, Florida; and Claremont.


