
Suggest a Parade Theme for 2022!

As you are probably aware by now, we have moved the date of our annual alumni festivities and parade to October 2nd, 2021. We hope that with this change, the pandemic will be even more contained and give everyone the opportunity to venture out without the fear of Covid-19 lingering in their minds. We made this change early because of the need to book bands and other units that have to be made months in advance.

We are also hoping that this fall date might coincide with Homecoming weekend and also the annual Chili cook-off event.

We have cancelled the banquet again this year for multiple reasons: we cannot hire a caterer for less than \$40 a plate; the closeness of attendees having to sit together is also a deterrent. We will not have a luncheon buffet for the annual meeting although, at this time, we intend to have the annual meeting following the parade. THIS is a tentative plan and we will keep you informed of any changes.

We had planned a more spectacular parade as this is our "150 Reunion" and will book as many of our marching units as we can. However, we are finding that some units are still not travelling to participate in parades. That is understandable and we will do the best we can to make this a parade that everyone will remember and enjoy. I do know that we will have a combination of last year's 5-year classes along with this year's 5-year classes taking part which will increase the size of the parade and with the two themes; it should be a fun time for all.

We also had to consider the travel involved for members coming from across the country to take part in their class reunions, and we hope that this date change will be more convenient for them also. We are in uncharted waters as we have never had to cancel alumni weekend of all class gatherings, the banquet and the parade. To my knowledge, only one parade has ever been postponed due to rain only to rally later in the day and proceed as planned.

Again, the date for our 150th reunion is Saturday, Oct 2nd, 2021 with a theme of "SHS Alumni Association Celebrates Our 150th Reunion Celebration". Last year's theme of "Board Games" is also available, so having two themes to work with should be interesting and lots of fun for both the participants and the on-lookers.

As you can see from the report, our operating account is still in the black. The parade donations received from last year will be used towards this year's 150th celebration parade. The parade as some still think, is not free, We have to pay for every group to participate and the cost is usually between \$15,000 and \$18.000. We will do our very best to make the 150th Celebration an event to remember with pride, honor and the distinction of being a part of this: The Oldest Active High School Alumni Association in the USA.

The Association's Board voted in February to move the parade and alumni festivities to Oct 2nd in hope that we would attract more participation in the parade, as well as, making more spectators feel safer to venture out and to watch our traditional annual parade.

The good news is we expect more class participation as the 5year classes from 2020 will combine with this year's 5-year classes to create many interesting floats. Last year's theme of "Board Games" is still open as well as the theme for this year of "Stevens Alumni Association Proudly Presents Our 150th Reunion Celebration 1871 to 2021".

Annual dues continue to raise over \$7000 and there have been more donations come in for the parade which is encouraging. Still, with an active membership of over 7300, that is less than \$1 a member. To those of you who continue to pay your dues and send additional when you can, we thank you very much.

Yes the Covid 19 has struck so many people so very hard and some have suffered the ultimate loss of a loved one. We have had to change our whole way of life, which less than two years ago, we took for granted. Stevens Alumni Association has suffered as well as have all non-profit organizations, but we have remained strong and will continue to do so with the help of you, our membership.

The cost for the parade every year is between \$16,000 and \$18,000 and with this year being a special year for Stevens Alumni, we would like to book more units, but as I had said earlier, a lot of units are still not taking bookings for parades. We will do the very best that we can to make Stevens High School Alumni Reunion Weekend the best ever. Help us do that. If you have never paid your dues, it is not too late to start. The annual dues are still \$10 and I will say it again if the 7500 members of this great organization paid their dues? You do the math.

We also have a tee-shirt fund raiser thru the Ink Factory in Claremont. Orders will be taken for tee shirts, long sleeve shirts, sweat shirts. Sadly, we had two classmate deaths this year. Noel Fontaine last January (2020) and Donald Foster in October.


I hope to be in Claremont in October and see many of you. Anyone reading this; please pay your alumni dues. It really helps keep the Alumni Association going.

She leaves behind her daughter, Lauren Ragonese (husband Eric) and granddaughter Scarlett; sister and best friend Connie and her partner Craig Newman of Jericho, VT; and several cousins, extended family, and numerous friends.

While at Stevens, Louise was a member of the Thespian Society, Dramatics Club, Christmas Choir, and tennis and field hockey teams. She attended one year of high school in Franklin, PA as her father was an engineer with Joy Manufacturing Company in PA before relocating to Claremont.

Suzanne (Cassin) Davis passed away on July 12, 2020. She was born on December 10, 1946. Beyond this, no other information is available regarding Suzanne. While at Stevens, she was a member of the Dramatics Club and Red and Black yearbook committee her senior year.

Judge Albert Dennis Leahy, Jr., '51

Judge Albert Dennis Leahy Jr. passed away on April 19th at the age of 87. He was predeceased by his parents, Judge Albert Leahy Sr. and his wife Helen Leahy, his brother Charles Leahy and his two infant children, Robert and Caroline Leahy.

Judge Leahy, known to most as Al or Albie, was a life-long resident of Claremont before moving in 2019 with his wife, Patricia Henry Leahy, to Exeter, NH. A graduate of Stevens High School (1951),

Al then graduated from Yale University (1955). Following his graduation from Yale, Al joined the United States Marine Corps where he served as a lieutenant. During his time in the Marine Corps, he was a General's Aide at Twentynine Palms in California and later oversaw drill instructors at the San Diego Marine Recruit Depot. Upon completing his tour of duty, Al decided to follow in the family footsteps and attend Harvard Law School (1961) to become an attorney. His father, Albert D. Leahy Sr., was both an attorney and district court judge and his Uncle, John Leahy, was Chief Justice of the New Hampshire Superior Court. Both Al and his brother Charles returned to NH to establish life-long careers as practicing attorneys. While in law school, Al met his soon-to-be wife, Patty. Three months after their first date, he proposed and the two of them were married for almost 61 years. After graduating from law school, Al and Patty return to Claremont where Al joined his father's law firm, Leahy & Denault. In 1972, Governor Walter Peterson appointed Al to succeed his father as the Presiding Justice of the Claremont District Court. During his time on the bench, his particular joy came with his work in the juvenile court system where he felt he could potentially play a part in changing a young person's life for the better.

Always wanting to support the local community, Al volunteered to serve on many boards including The Claremont National Bank, The Claremont Savings Bank and he also served as a trustee of the Valley Regional Hospital. Al later stated that one of his proudest moments was being one of the founders of what has since become known as West Central Behavioral Health which ensures access to support services for those in need. Al loved his hometown of Claremont. In 2001, after 40 years, he retired to spend more time with his family and friends. Throughout his life, he was an avid golf and tennis player and enjoyed spending countless hours playing both sports with his wife, children, grandchildren and his wonderful Claremont friends.

It was time with family that brought AI the greatest joy. He was a wonderful father and beloved grandfather to his five grandchildren, Kyle, Tyler, Morgan, Helen and Jackson. No matter where family gathered, whether in Claremont, the family camp on Crescent Lake, vacation trips to Maine or time in St. Simon's Georgia, Grampa could always be counted on for his witty comments and sense of humor. Whether doing a "boomba" cannonball off the dock and into the lake, adding his unexpected but hilarious descriptors when playing Mad Libs, Sunday morning doughnut runs, or endless rounds of mini-golf, Grampa was always a favorite with his grandchildren.

Al is survived by his wife of 60 years, Patricia Henry Leahy, his daughter Alison Angle, his sonin-law Jeffrey Angle, his son William Leahy and his daughter-in-law Bethany Leahy, his five grandchildren, family members Mary Susan Leahy, Barbara Leahy and his nieces, nephews and cousins.

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Marshall M. Gelfand, '45

Marshall M. Gelfand CLAREMONT — Three generations said a loving goodbye to Marshall Morris Gelfand, formerly of Claremont, New Hampshire, who passed April 1, 2021, at 93 years old, an impactful life well-lived. Marshall is survived by his children, Todd Evan Gelfand (Doreen), Elizabeth Gelfand Stearns (Richard) and Dean Loring Gelfand (Marcie); along with eight grandchildren, Brian Gelfand (Monica), Ilana McBride (Marcus), Gregory Stearns (Gabriella),

Jacqueline Stearns (Spencer), Ben Gelfand (Samy), Sophie Gelfand, Ella Stearns and Andrew Gelfand; along with four great-grandchildren, Ayla, Addy and Riley Gelfand and Lively McBride.

Marshall M Gelfand was born on Dec. 14, 1927, in Claremont, New Hampshire. Marshall's parents, Annie Senoff Gelfand and Isaac N. Gelfand, both immigrated from Russia in the early-1900s settling in Claremont, New Hampshire, where they lived for over 50 years. Annie and Isaac had three children, Edith Gelfand Takiff (b.1921), Natalie Gelfand Remis (b.1923) and Marshall Morris Gelfand (b.1927). Isaac spent his life as the local tailor in Claremont, working under the eponymous sign, I.N. GELFAND TAILOR FINE CLOTHES. This century-old sign lives today in the Gelfand family home in Orford, New Hampshire. Marshall graduated from Stevens High School in Claremont in 1945. He was the editor of the Stevens High School yearbook, played varsity basketball, was awarded the DAR History award and was a graduation speaker. Marshall graduated from Syracuse University in 1950, with a degree in accounting from the Whitman School of Management. He was welcomed into the 25-man pledge class of Sigma Alpha Mu fraternity. These two events began a lifetime of dedication, leadership and service to his beloved Syracuse University and to Sigma Alpha Mu. In 1983, Marshall was appointed to Syracuse University Board of Trustees, and remained a trustee emeritus. Marshall was instrumental in the establishment of Syracuse University Los Angeles. In 1996, Marshall received the George Arents Pioneer Medal and in 2007, the Melvin A. Eggers Senior Alumni Award, the highest honors that Syracuse University bestows. Marshall's lifetime of leadership of the Sigma Alpha Mu Eta Chapter is memorialized by the dedication of the fraternity house in his name on the Syracuse campus. Marshall

served his country in 1946 as an enlisted Naval Correspondent based in Washington, DC, and again during the Korean War in 1951, serving 20 months at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. Marshall graduated from New York University School of Law in 1956 and became a member of the New York Bar Association in 1958. In 1959, he became a partner at Lawin & Futter, a New York accounting film. Marshall became the accountant and business manager for Peter Paul & Mary, Bob Dylan and Neil Diamond in 1966. These clients launched a direction that changed his career and the industry he helped build. In 1967, Marshall opened his own accounting firm which, over the next 55 years, grew into the largest international business management firm in the entertainment industry, Gelfand Rennert & Feldman, LLC. Today, Gelfand Rennert & Feldman represents clients in all facets of the entertainment and sports industries, along with high-net-worth families. While the firm's success has reached great heights, it was the 500 employees and nine offices worldwide that Marshall remained most proud of.

Marshall married Judy Jaffe in 1955 at the Pierre Hotel in New York City. They lived in Forest Hills and Great Neck, New York, followed by a move to Palm Springs, California, in 1973, where they raised their three children. Marshall and Judy were both philanthropic leaders in Palm Springs. Marshall served as president of the Palm Springs Art Museum, The Barbara Sinatra Children's Center and Temple Isaiah. Their philanthropic work is permanently honored with their own star on the Palm Springs Walk of Stars. Marshall established The Judy Fund in 2004 in memory of his wife, Judy, who died of Alzheimer's disease. The Judy Fund is the largest family fund in the history of the Alzheimer's Association, and has raised over \$9 million in support of Alzheimer's research and care. In 2014, Marshall received the Sargent and Eunice Shriver Profiles in Dignity award for his work with The Judy Fund. After Judy's passing, Marshall met and married Jacqueline Rudman, and they spent 12 wonderful years together in Rancho Mirage, California. If the measure of a person's life can be determined by how they were loved and the positive impact that they made on the world around them, then there can be no doubt that Marshall M. Gelfand lived a rich, happy and successful life. Marshall will be buried alongside Judy in a private family ceremony at Wiefels & Son Mortuary in Palm Springs, California. On a future date, there will be a Celebration of a Life Well Lived. Pickles with Papa will continue, every Sunday, in his memory. NEWS from the PARADE CHAIR Richard "Dick" Girard '61

Over the last few months SHS Alumni has gone through an update of our website where you can view parade information including the parade theme and registration form. We are also going to post the themes that have already been chosen so there will be no **duplication** of themes. We hope this will be advantageous for those classes that are trying to choose their class theme. Once your class has registered and the theme has been acknowledged, no one else can use it. So, it is important to get together early to both determine your theme and quickly register it.

As you all know, there was no parade last year, thus, we are planning on a much larger parade this year combining both the 150th Celebration of 2020's class, their Kings and Queens and associated 5-year anniversary classes, and this year's 2021 class, their Kings and Queens and associated 5-year classes on Saturday, October 2nd. At this junction take a right onto Broad Street for the return to Stevens High School where the parade bands and other participants will disband. The route will be about a half mile longer.

Please take note that we always look forward to having St. Mary High School classes take part in the parade; especially this year, for it marks the 50th year of St. Mary High School closing. Also keep your eyes out for the 2020 and 2021 classes' kings, queens, and each class's selection for grand marshals at the head of the parade.

As in past years, we are inviting businesses and organizations, and all non-5 year classes that would like to participate in the parade, go to the SHS Alumni Association Web Site and fill out the registration form. If you own or run a business and you are an alumnus, please consider participating. We are very proud of our alumni members and their accomplishments and encourage them to register early in order for us to make street layout signs ahead of time and start working on lineups.

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From the 1916 Catalogue of the Alumni of Stevens High School

On February 29th, 1916, the splendidly equipped building of the remodeled Stevens High School was dedicated, fifty years from the time when Paran Stevens presented to the town of Claremont the generous gift which made possible the foundation of the new school. Mr. Stevens was a man well-known throughout the country as manager of the Fifth Avenue Hotel in New York and other leading hotels in America. Born in Claremont in 1802, he had been until 1843 a resident of the town, and it was an expression of his sincere interest in his birthplace that Mr. Stevens, in 1866, offered to Claremont the sum of \$10,000 (the equivalent of \$165,000 today) to aid in establishing a high school, upon condition that the town should raise an equal amount for the same purpose.

In 1866 Mr. Stevens offered \$10,000 towards establishing a high school in Claremont, provided the town would raise \$15,000. Mr. Stevens also presented the school with a Chickering grand piano, valuable life-size portraits of George Washington and Daniel Webster, and a fund of \$10,000.

At his death in 1872, he left a will containing a bequest of \$40,000, to be invested with the \$10,000 already given, as a permanent fund for the use of the school.

The offer was gladly accepted, and within two years the building was completed, at a cost of \$27,000. Mr. Stevens, adding to the original gift, had contributed near-

ly one-half of this sum. The school was formally opened on September 7, 1868, with an enrollment of 98 students and three teachers. Mr. Stevens at this time established a permanent trust fund of \$10,000, of which the income was to be used for support for the school. At his death in 1872, he left a bequest of \$40,000 to be added to this fund. Owing to litigation in connection with the estate, the bequest was not paid until the spring of 1901, at which time the town received the sum of \$72,050.

The original building of Stevens High School is well known to most of its alumni. It was a dignified brick structure of three stories with accommodations for 125 pupils; and for many years it served its purpose admirably. By 1908, however, the number of pupils had increased to 156. An addition to the building was deemed necessary, and on April 10, 1909, the town voted the sum of \$8,000 for this purpose.

Work was begun at the close of the school year and the building was completed during the summer. The addition consisted of a single story, 94 by 32 feet, extending across the front of the original building, and harmonizing with its architecture. The new structure contained a laboratory, a class room and a head master's office. It also furnished increased corridor space, and made possible the establishment of a manual training room in the basement.

By 1914, even this addition was found to be inadequate. Because of the increasingly attractive courses offered by the school, the influence of state child labor laws, the growth of the population, and other contributing causes, the number of pupils had been notably augmented, and had reached a total of 217. That the yearly increase in the size of the school would continue, seemed inevitable. It was obvious that, to provide adequate facilities for the pupils of years to come, as well as for those already enrolled, the building must be radically remodeled.

Accordingly, in the spring of 1914, a committee was elected to secure plans and estimates of the cost of the necessary alterations. Upon the report of the committee, at the town meeting on March 9, 1915, an appropriation of \$73,000 was voted for the purpose of enlarging and remodeling the Stevens High School building. The preliminary committee, consisting of Ira. G. Colby, Edward J. Rossiter, Frank P. Maynard, William E. Patterson, and Thomas W. Fry was re-elected as a building committee.



The plans of Brainard and Leeds, Architects, of Boston, were accepted and work was commenced before the end of school. The building was completed on December 31st, the students, during the autumn term of school, using only the rooms of the old building.

The new structure, which is of brick with cement trimmings, contains 21 rooms, available for recitations and laboratory work, whereas the old building had only 9. Four recitation rooms, a head master's office, a commodious study hall, and an assembly hall, are situated on the first floor. The assembly hall has accommodations for 300 on the floor and 50 on the stage. A balcony seating 100, can later be added. On the second floor are seven recitation rooms; and on the third floor, in addition to the old assembly hall now used for drawing classes, the remodeled building contains three laboratories, cooking and sewing rooms, two teachers' rooms, and an emergency rest room. In the basement are located a lunch room and kitchen, at present not used, room for manual training, including a prospective forge room, a shower bath and drying room for boys, and similar accommodations for girls.

A description of the equipment of the building may be of interest to those who remember the limited facilities of earlier times. A hot water plant with separate furnace supplies the laboratories, manual training, cooking, and drawing rooms, and various others. The bells for opening, period changes, and dismissal, are rung by an automatic electric clock. There is a private fire alarm system, and an interfloor telephone. The manual training room is equipped with power lathes, and the cooking and sewing rooms respectively with gas stoves and sewing machines. A glass partition between the bookkeeping and typewriting rooms shuts out the sound of the typewriters and makes it possible for one teacher to supervise both rooms. In every detail the building is modern, convenient and attractive.

The school, which at present maintains a teaching corps of nine regular and three special teachers, and has during the past year given instruction to 239 pupils, is supported by an annual appropriation from the town and by the income of two trust funds. The first of these, the Stevens fund, has already been described. The second was established in 1901 by Mrs. Helen R. Healey, a resident of Claremont, who, at her death, bequeathed to the town the residue of her estate, amounting to \$71,420, in trust, as a permanent fund, "the income to be expended to the best advantage for the advancement, prosperity, and support of the school." A third bequest was that of Mrs. Mary B. Alden, who, in 1869, left her entire estate amounting to \$3,000, as a trust fund, the income of which should

be pain annually to those three members of the graduating class attaining the highest rank in the English studies.

It is hard to exaggerate the value to the community of a well conducted school. Stevens High School is closing the first half century of its existence with every promise of each year increasing its usefulness, and of bringing each year, new honor to the name of Paran Stevens, its founder.


